FAMILY AFFAIR Ballards raise funds to heal local father's heart and lungs

If hearts could be mended with love, Eric Ballard wouldn't need surgery.

But the chemotherapy and radiation used to fight his Hodgkin's disease diagnosed 20 years ago when he was just 19 have ravaged his heart and lungs to the point where his heart requires aortic valve replacement and carotid artery repair. Both lungs need to be replaced.

So, family and friends are rallying their love and into a benefit energy event on Saturday, Sept. 6, from 3 to 11 p.m. at the Oakfield Conservation Club. The public is encouraged to attend.

The goal is to raise funds to help offset un-covered costs of the medical interventions. While the Ballards are fortunate that the actual surgeries are covered by insurance, the procedures require significant co-pays and considerable travel to and from The Cleveland Clin-

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ry about me, I'm fine. said Lisa Gitter, Ballard's Oakfield-based cousin cousin who organizing the fundraiser with the help of other family members. "It is getting so costly. Stephanie misses work. I said, 'Eric, it is time we

help you as a family."
Eric Ballard's health
path already has included a return of the Hodgkin's lymphoma and a stem cell transplant in 2005. Four years later, heart damage from earlier cancer treatment led to a coronary bypass. And 2010 brought a diagnosis of a bone mardiagnosis of a bone mar-row syndrome called MDS, followed by a bone marrow transplant in 2011 and more chemotherapy.

The next heart repair is expected to take place by early October. The lung transplant, however, is on hold until Ballard is cancer-free for years.

Stephanie Ballard noted that waiting on the lung transplant is also wise because life expec-tancy after transplant is generally five to 10 years.

"It's smarter to treat it like patchwork," she said. "I am OK talking about it," Eric Ballard said of his continued health issues. "I'd rather get it out there and talk about it. there and talk about it. Once I know what is going on ... once I know the prognosis ... I keep tushing. My family is more emotional than I am. As I long as I know what I have to do. I'm fine."

have to do, I'm fine." Eric Ballard's weakening physical state meant quitting his job as a metal

worker at RB Royal Industries last year. The combined heart and lung trouble now keep the lifelong Fond du Lac resident homebound and on oxygen. The heart problem impedes his ability to eat, and his wife estimates he has lost about 100 pounds in the past year. Family photos on the wall show a

much more robust man. Stephanie Ballard con-tinues to teach chemistry and earth science at Campbellsport High School where she has been on the faculty staff for 18 years. She also has taught in the UW-Fond du Lac College for Kids and LEAPS program for 15 years.

An Iowa native, Ste-phanie Ballard laughs while recounting how she came to Campbellsport for a year of teaching exfor a year of teaching experience at the beginning of her career, and stayed — "Trapped," she joked — after being introduced to Eric by her neighbors. While Luckson enjoyed a year of school at Fond du Lac's Lakeshore Elementary, he will com

Elementary, he will commute with his mother and continue his education in Campbellsport to ease the family's transporta-

ition situation.

"The people I work with are so wonderful to me," Stephanie Ballard service project doi: service project dedicated to the Ballards and her colleague's ongoing sup-port. "Campbellsport is so tight-knit. It is a community that takes care of everyone."

Luckson is the high point on the Ballard's hard road of health. The couple adopted him from Haiti in 2010 when Luck-son was 2, and Eric was in

very healthy.

"Adoption is difficult,"
Stephanie Ballard said.
"We knew a domestic adoption wouldn't happen due to health. We picked Haiti because of its close proximity, so he could visit when he is older. It has worked out so well. We adore him so much.
God put us together."
Luckson, who now enjoys T-ball and soccer, as

well as Ninja Turtles and LEGOs, accompanies his parents on the nine-hour trips to Cleveland. "He is such a trouper on those trips," Stephanie said, smiling at her son. "He doesn't like to be away doesn't like to be away trips." doesn't like to be away from us for long, and it is better to stay together. He is the best kid you'll ever see. He has a string bag that he packs up with books, markers, the Kin-dle, and toys for appoint. dle, and toys for appoint-ments. He is responsible for packing it on his own. He is a very good helper."
